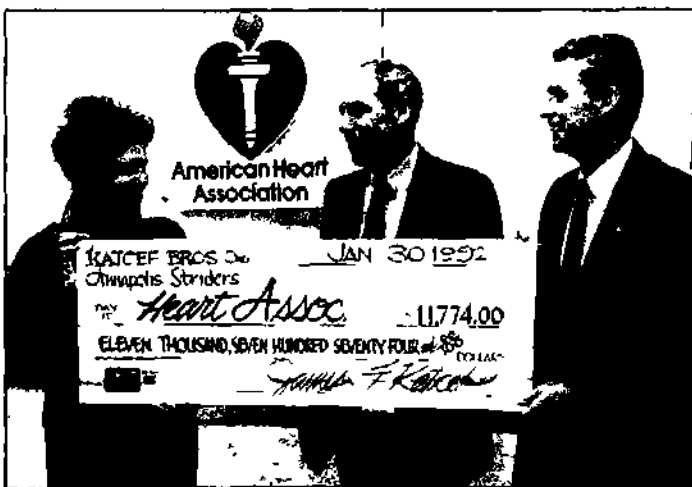

RUN FOR HEART

Donation received

The alliance for a Drug-Free Annapolis recently donated \$2,500 to Hope House, Anne Arundel County's only nonprofit intermediate residential treatment center for chemical dependency

The money is helping to finance the newly created intensive outpatient services, located at Alcohol Drug Program Management (ADPM) in Annapolis.

These services are designed for clients unable to gain immediate access into residential treatment; for those with a stable home environment; or for those with commit-

ments, such as jobs and childcare

Providence center

The Providence Center, a private non-profit group that offers day programs and transportation services for adults with developmental disabilities, recently hosted a reception for the Maryland Association of Community Services.

The MACS membership is comprised of executive directors and key staff of agencies that provide community-based services to individuals with developmental disabilities.

They were in Annapolis for meeting with key Maryland legislators.
