
Another A-10 in the Books

Well, the 22nd Annapolis Ten is in the books. This year had two firsts. One brought our race onto the cutting edge of race management and the other was a tragic reminder of our mortality.

The unfortunate death of one of our runners during the race put a somber note to an otherwise outstanding event. Joseph Sokol died of an apparent heart attack at the 7 1/2 mile point. He was a 47 year old pharmacist from Ellicott City; had done the A-10 four previous times, and was a seasoned runner, without apparent prior indications of a problem. Sue Briers and I attended the viewing and visited at length with the family. A \$500 donation has been made in Joseph's memory to the University of Maryland's School of Pharmacy in Baltimore on behalf of the Annapolis Ten and the Annapolis Striders.

The introduction of the computer chip was an overwhelming success. The system worked flawlessly. The only problems were with runners not following directions concerning the wearing of the chip. I've received 47 internet messages and every one gave us glowing remarks about how smoothly things went with the chip; they really liked not being "penalized" for having to start back in the pack. The Annapolis Ten Mile Run was once again a tremendous success. The race had over 4100 registered runners and about 3275 scored finishers. The weather was absolutely wonderful probably the best in the history of the race. The organization of the race by Race Director, Ron Bowman was right on. With the inclusion of the new electronic timing system, ChampionChip, the race was elevated to a new level to be included in the ranks of such well known events as the Boston Marathon and the Disney Marathon. The volunteer effort was phenomenal. The race uses over 490 volunteers. Ron was able to solicit the assistance of some new volunteers such as the Harley Davidson Club and the Girl Scouts.

I would like to thank the race committee for the super job they did for our race. We have a few volunteers, most who are race committee members, who have worked on this race every year for as long as I can remember and do a huge amount of work to make the Annapolis Ten Mile Run "one of the top one hundred races in the country". Thank you to all who participated, worked as a volunteer or offered services.

Special thanks to the Annapolis Police Department, A.A. Co. Police Department, Maryland State Police, Naval Academy and the Naval Academy Stadium Officials.


Tribute To A Fallen Runner

In all the fanfare and excitement of the Annapolis Ten Mile Run there was a tremendous loss in the running community. At mile 7.5 of the race in the Naval Academy, the Annapolis Ten Mile Run suffered a tragedy.

Joseph Sokol, a Howard County Strider, was the unfortunate victim of a presumed cardiac arrest. Many of the runners witnessed the heroic attempts of two runners and medical personnel to save Joe but to no avail. Our hearts and prayers go to the Sokol family as they grieve the loss of their loved one. Ron Bowman and I attended the funeral viewing of Joseph and were fortunate enough to learn what an active and well respected man he was. A pharmacist who lived in Columbia, MD, Joe was an Howard County Strider who had run the Annapolis Ten Mile Run four times prior. He was active in his community and in his professional career as represented by the scores of people who came to his viewing. He left a wonderful family of three teenage daughters and a wife, Betsv.

In memory of Joe, the Annapolis Ten Mile Run and the Annapolis Striders have made a \$500 contribution to the family's charity of choice, the University of Maryland, School of Pharmacy.

The Sokol family wanted us to relay the warm thoughts they had for the Annapolis Striders and all the medical assistance and aid given to Joe by the race staff. My thanks to the Medical Director, Mark Chaput and his staff for providing the best professional support in a time of need.



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on the superb support and organization the 500 volunteers provided the runners. I had an email from one runner that Sunday afternoon - sent as soon as he arrived at his home in Philadelphia. Some of you might have seen the nice note in Wednesday's Capital Reader's Views from the City Manager of LaPlata, MD. I also received a call from a Vice President of Conoco requesting information on race organization and use of the chip for a race they are sponsoring in Houston this fall.

Bottom Line - Every one of the almost 500 volunteers should give yourself a pat on the back. You really outdid yourselves. Due to probably the best weather conditions ever (mid-70's, low humidity), we had the second largest number of finishers at 3,297. The race results were available on a 900# that afternoon, on the Internet and our web page the following Tuesday, and results postcards by Thursday.

The Expo/Registration was also a resounding success. Located in the open parking area under the Anne Arundel Medical Center pavilion, it provided more room for the 30 vendors and packet pick-up. Vendors sales were up 15 - 20% from previous years (we get a percentage of sells). Also, complaint calls to our Hotline after the race have been down significantly from previous
